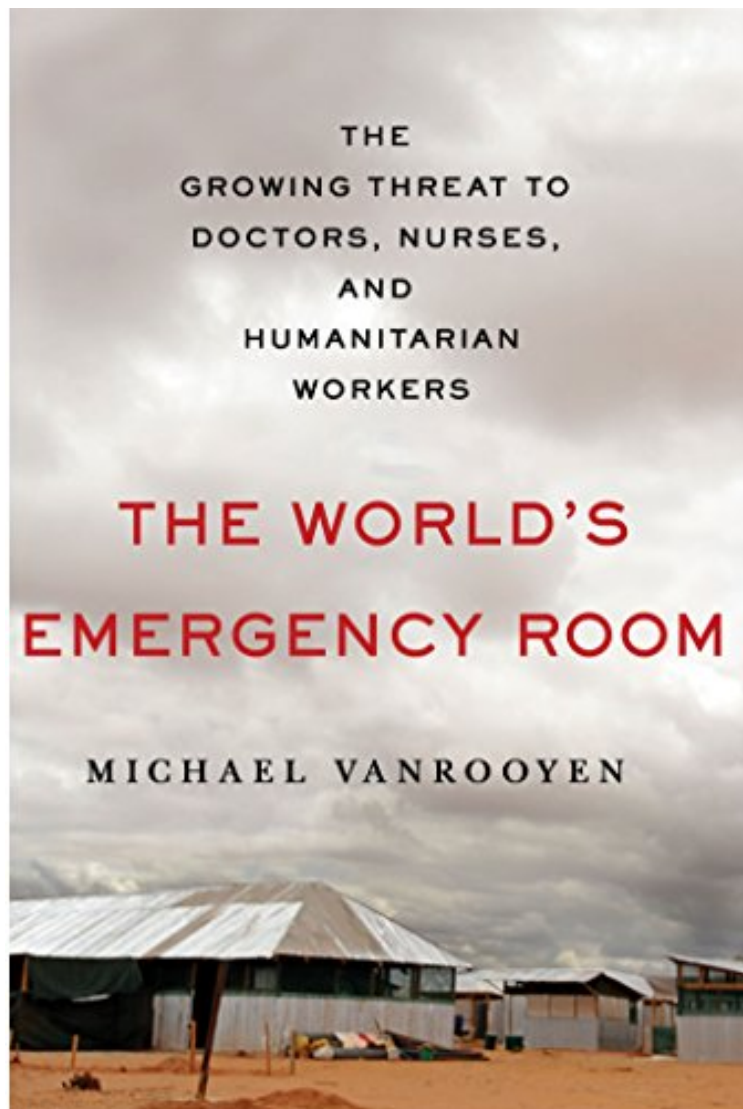

Dr Van Rooyen weaves these themes together very well and this makes both an enjoyable read about his experiences in various disaster scenarios as well as about the political realities of delivering humanitarian assistance in a world characterized by good will but fragmented, uncoordinated and increasingly dangerous work. The days of heroic Western physicians and other caregivers coming to the rescue of desperate masses and then leaving a grateful population are long gone. Workers interested in helping needy populations affected by natural disaster or war have become both targets and the pawns of power brokers at many levels. Humanitarian workers face enormous challenges in this new world and he looks to a new generation of workers using political savvy as well as social media and other 21st century technologies to continue the work begun by national and international organizations to help with a completely different world order than that of the past century. The author's bias is as an emergency physician so he can be forgiven the omission of many other health providers--surgeons, gynecologists, anesthesiologists and others--who are also a formidable cadre providing global humanitarian assistance. Twenty years ago, the most common cause of death for medical humanitarians and other aid workers was traffic accidents; today, it is violent attacks. And the death of each doctor, nurse, paramedic, midwife, and vaccinator is multiplied untold times in the vulnerable populations deprived of their care. In a 2005 report, the ICRC found that for every soldier killed in the war in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, more than 60 civilians died due to loss of immunizations and other basic health services.The World's Emergency Room: The Growing Threat to Doctors, Nurses, and Humanitarian Workers documents this dangerous trend, demonstrates the urgent need to reverse it, and explores how that can be accomplished.
