Part Family Practice, part Emergency Medicine, Urgent Care fills a huge gap in the US's faulty health care system. Edwards' and Mayer's book is an adequate primer. They manage to touch on most of what is seen; the format is clear; and each section has "red flags" to keep you out of trouble. A surprising amount of material is covered in a digestible space, and is hands-on and practical. A larger, more detailed text is needed, but if you have a
