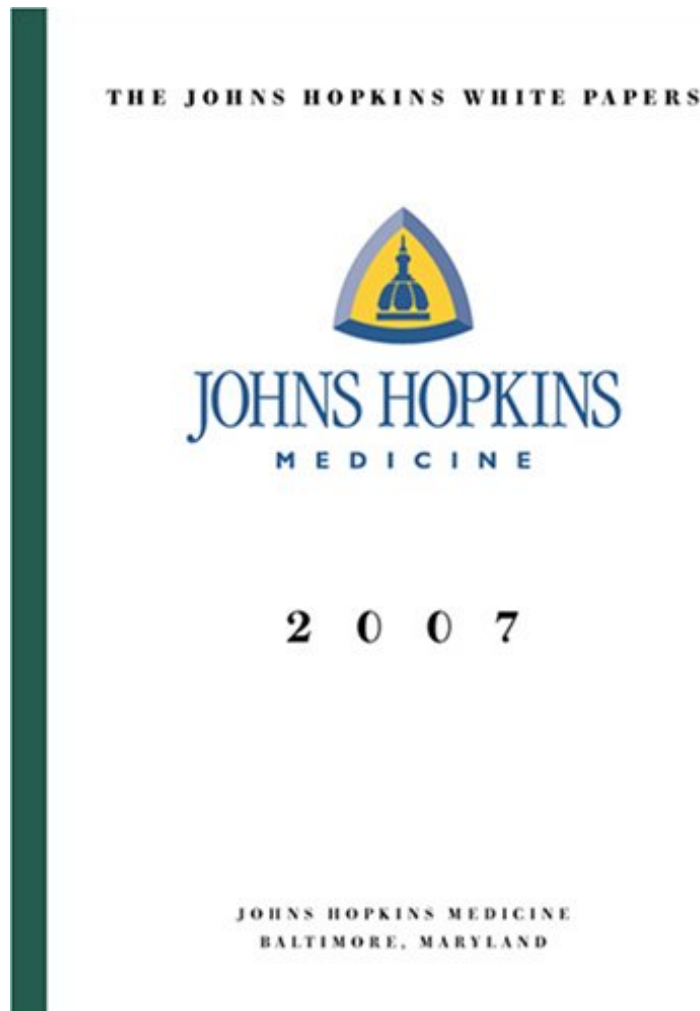

Bressler, M.D., graduated from Smith College and then attended the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine, where she received the Paul Ehrlich Award for Clinical Investigation for her first project in ophthalmology on age-related macular degeneration. After completing an internship in internal medicine at Johns Hopkins Hospital, she pursued an ophthalmology residency at Harvard Medical School's Massachusetts Eye Ear Infirmary. After a fellowship in medical retina at the Wilmer Eye Institute at Johns Hopkins Hospital and additional retinal surgery training at Massachusetts Eye Ear Infirmary, she returned to join the faculty at the Wilmer Eye Institute, where she became a professor of ophthalmology and later the first Julia G. Levy Professor of Ophthalmology. Dr. Bressler has published more than 140 peer-reviewed articles and served on the editorial boards of the American Journal of Ophthalmology, Survey of Ophthalmology, Retina, and The Johns Hopkins Medical Letter: Health After 50. Her main research interest has been collaborative efforts in clinical trials, with specific emphasis on the treatment of choroidal neovascularization in age-related macular degeneration. She has received the Rosenthal Award from the Macula Society, the Olga Keith Wiess Scholar Award from Research to Prevent Blindness, and a Senior Achievement Award from the American Academy of Ophthalmology. Harry A. Quigley, M.D., is the A. Edward Maumenee Professor of Ophthalmology and the director of both the Glaucoma Service and the Dana Center for Preventive Ophthalmology at the Wilmer Eye Institute at Johns Hopkins Hospital. He was a founding member of the American Glaucoma Society and served as its secretary for eight years. He was elected chief executive officer of the Association for Research in Vision and Ophthalmology and served as editor-in-chief of Investigative Ophthalmology and Visual Science. Oliver D. Schein, M.D., M.P.H., is the Burton E. Grossman Professor of Oph
